Chesham Bois Cricket Club. An amended plan of the proposed pavilion to be erected on the common was submitted by the Cricket Club. The alterations provided for exit doors at the rear (suggested by the County Fire Officer) and modifications to the veranda to minimise the possibility of wilful damage, and concrete flooring. The amendments were approved and it was agreed that the plan be submitted to the Lord of the Manor for his approval It was understood that the Club would submit an application for assistance under the Physical Training & Recreation Act and the Council agreed in principle to support such an application.

Club Plan for new pavilion approved but-

CHESHAM BOIS Cricket Club's request to build a new wooden pavilion on The Common was approved in principle at Chesham Bois Parish Council's meeting on Tuesday.

The club want a larger, permanent 25 by 18 ft. pavilion with adequate toilets to replace the present small building.

However, there is one possible hitch which wories the council. The clerk is to make inquiries about the legal position of placing a permanent building on The Common.

FORBIDDEN?

It is understood that permanent structures are forbidden on such common ground. But the council feels that the proposed small pavilion would not mar the the existing rural amenities.

Mr. F. W. E. King, chairman, said: "We, as a Parish Council, should try and meet the wishes of the cricket club."

Mr. W. Russell Neill agreed, but added: "I feel the calibre of this construction should be the subject of close scrutiny. We seem merely to have a hut. I think we must require a building of good structure which would not spoil the Common.

'LARGE'

"It is a building relatively large for the area of the Common and we don't want it to be obtrusive. An attractive cedar building would be much better."

Mr. King suggested that the Amersham Rural District Council should be approached over the possibility of a small grant for the scheme.

Major H. E. Eayres considered the proposed pavilion to be too big a structure, so abstained from voting.

THOUGHTS OF THE 1964 SEASON

WRITTEN BY MR. STAFFORD BURBRIDGE PLAYER 1964 – 1977

WRITTEN DECEMBER 1982

This was my first season with the club. I was coming home on the train one day when I got talking to a bloke about cricket. This bloke was David Smith, who was the Chesham Bois Saturday skipper and also, I recall, Team Secretary. He told me the club wanted a wicket keeper and, presto, the next Saturday I turned up at the common to play my first game, against The Hill from Harrow. Our bowling in those days

consisted of David Smith and John French, the Saturday vice captain, who was a very steady and quite pacey bowler. That was the opening attack and the supporting bowlers consisted of the likes of Peter Nash and dear old Len Hammond and one or two others whose names escape me at the moment. To be perfectly honest we had a pretty weak team that season and David Smith used to spend quite a lot of time on Saturday mornings cajoling and rounding up players. David didn't possess a car at that time so I used to pick him up from his house in Old Amersham on Saturday afternoons

I remember very clearly on one occasion that season driving David to the common when he spied two young blokes walking in the direction of Copperkins Lane. He shouted out at them, "Where are you going?" One of them replied "Nowhere special David". To which he replied, in a voice that could be heard away in Chesham, "Yes you are, you're on your way to the common", that day at least we managed to turn out a full eleven men.

Bill Washington was, of course, the club scorer and we would collect him from his cottage in Copperkins Lane before every game.

I only played on Saturdays for Chesham Bois in those days. One of the reasons for this was that David Smith had his own team "Caboclo" on Sundays, nothing to do with Chesham Bois, and I frequently found myself playing for them.

If my memory serves me right David Smith resigned as Team Secretary at the beginning of the 1965 season, after a fracas with David Hearn at the common. That was how yours truly came to take on the job of Team Secretary.

One thing I do remember about the 1964 season was that I came second in the batting averages, mainly due to the fact that I was not out on many occasions. Shows you what a poor batting side we had that season doesn't it.

Stafford Burbridge (1964-1977) + 1 game in 1985.

An enthusiastic cricketer and dedicated club member. Most of his career was spent behind the wickets as keeper, an art he performed most capably. He was a regular lower order batsman who stubbornly defended his wicket and shared many a match saving effort during his career. Always keen to help out in the club affairs he held the office of club secretary in the years 1967-1971 inclusive. A cheerful jovial person by nature he was missed when he retired from playing cricket to take up bowls at Chalfont St. Giles where he again became involved in the club's matters.

Inspector dealing with the matter had indicated that the Department would like the Club to have a lease for the pavilion site for a period of ten years. In order that there should be no undue delay in considering this question the Clerk had been requested to ascertain the views of the Lord of the Manor to the proposal and if these were favourable the Parish Council's Solicitors should be requested to prepare a draft lease for consideration at this meeting if possible.

A letter was read from Messrs. Francis & How stating that the Lord of the Manor had no objection to a lease being granted and that he would be willing to join in any document the Parish Council would care to submit

in order to carry this out.

The Clerk reported that he had instructed Messrs. Blaser, Mills & Lewis accordingly and an acknowledgment had been received to the effect that it was hoped to have a draft document ready for the Council's consideration by March 8th. The document had however not been received.

The Chairman's action was unanimously endorsed and it was also unanimously agreed that the Chairman be given authority to approve the draft on the Council's behalf if necessary.



Mr. Bridgstock-Choat 'thanked all the nublic bodies named and the residents of Chesham Bois who subscribed to the pavilion fund and presented the club with a shed, chairs, clock and many other items of requirement.

Erection of the pavilion, which provides two dressing rooms each with washing facilities kitchen, and two lavatories, and a common room, was undertaken Wr. Edward Greenham Chesham builder, who is also a vice-president of the club.

TRIBUTE

Mr. Choat thought the greatest credit for the club's success and indeed its continued exist ence, was due to Mr. Ian Gomm indefatigable secretary.
